Welcome!

Whatever your religious background, and however you have come to be here, we're glad to have you join in our praises of God today. We hope you will feel comfortable here and fulfilled, and strengthened spiritually to meet the challenges of your daily life.

The Season of Advent

The season of Advent begins a new liturgical cycle in the church. Every year we trace the life and ministry of Jesus Christ, from his birth to his resurrection. The central themes of Advent, a Latin word which means "coming" or "arrival," are expectation and longing for the birth of the Christ child. Advent is a time of preparation as we look forward to the great feast of Christ's incarnation, and we celebrate God dwelling among us in the person of Jesus.

During the season of Advent, we begin our worship together by lighting candles in the Advent wreath. The lighting of the Advent candles, one for each Sunday in Advent, helps us to focus on Jesus, the light of the world. Many individuals and families light Advent wreaths in their homes as well to highlight the story of God's redemption that will unfold throughout the year and throughout our lives.

Music for the Fourth Sunday of Advent

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Advent IV, is usually termed "Mary Sunday" since the Gospel reading centers on Mary. This year we also read the Magnificat, Mary's reaction to the news that she is to be the Mother of the Messiah. The closing hymn, "The Angel Gabriel" provides a wonderful summary of the Annunciation. It is a translation and paraphrase of a Spanish Carol which in turn was based upon a 14th century Latin hymn, "Angelus Virginem." Sabine Baring- Gould, an Anglican pastor and scholar (1200 publications), saw his poem paired with a Spanish tune to which it has become permanently attached. The two short preludes are based upon this melody.

"People Look East," (introit) is a text by Eleanor Farjeon (1881 1965) from the early part of the Twentieth Century. It did not make it into the Hymnal 1982, but is to be found in most other modern hymnals. The hymn is in the supplement to the present Episcopal hymnal. It is here the text is paired with a sprightly French carol melody, and as one commentator wrote: the piece "has the "spirit of a Christmas carol while having an Advent message." It admonishes us not only to prepare our homes for the coming visitor, but also our hearts.

The anthem utilizes the well known folk song "Greensleeves" but the text is for Advent instead of the usual one for Christmas.





And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren. For nothing will be


